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### Introduction and special features

This four-year degree in Japanese, Intercultural and Contemporary Communication – which includes a year in Japan – gives you the skills you need to work in Japan or in an international professional context. The programme is designed to help you gain Japanese language skills, a deep understanding of Japanese culture, the ability to communicate interculturally, and insight into different sociocultural language practices. You'll study how language relates to speakers' intentions and purposes in social interaction, social attitudes to language, and the way language choices can express identities and cultural values. This programme is ideal if you prefer two years of university study before studying abroad in Japan.

#### Special features:

- Start Japanese from beginners or with prior study. On arrival at York St John University you will be placed at an appropriate level, either Accelerated Japanese 1 or Japanese Communication 1.
- Study abroad between level 5 and level 6 – study Japanese for two years before going abroad.
- Take the Japanese Language Proficiency Test for no extra fee at level 6.
- Take part in extra-curricular activities related to Japanese language and culture: the vibrant student-run Japanese Society, where you can experience Japanese culture and meet home and exchange students, and the staff-led taiko drumming group, where you can learn a new skill and practice intercultural understanding.
- Access specialist spaces for students: a Linguistics Lab, Languages Workshop, Lounge and Study.
- Learn about current research issues and methods from guest lecturers in our Colloquium Series on a variety of topics related to programmes in the School of Language and Linguistics.

- Apply to join the University's Students-as-Researchers scheme or present your dissertation research at ULAB, the Undergraduate Linguistics Association of Britain conference.

### **Admissions criteria**

You must meet the University's general entry criteria for [undergraduate](#) study.

You can enter this programme as a beginner in Japanese. You can also enter if you have studied Japanese before and/or if you have any qualifications in Japanese.

The programme is not suitable if Japanese is your first language, or if you have C1 level of the Common European Framework for Languages (CEFR) in Japanese

If your first language is not English, you need to take an IELTS test or an equivalent qualification accepted by the University (see <https://www.yorksj.ac.uk/international/how-to-apply/english-language-requirements/>).

If you do not have traditional qualifications, you may be eligible for entry on the basis of [Accredited Prior \(Experiential\) Learning \(APL/APEL\)](#). We also consider applications for entry with advanced standing.

## Programme aims

By the end of the programme, successful students will reach upper B2/C1 Independent/Proficient User level on the JF standard for Japanese language education. You will be able to have conversations, give presentations, join in discussions, read articles and reports, and write coherently, communicating effectively for a range of academic, social and professional purposes. You will have both theoretical expertise and real-life experience in intercultural communication, enabling you to work in Japan or in an international professional context.

## **Learning, teaching and assessment**

### **Japanese**

You can enter this programme if you are a complete beginner or if you have studied Japanese before. On arrival at York St John University your Japanese level will be tested using a placement test. You will be placed at an appropriate level, either Accelerated Japanese 1 or Japanese Communication 1. Japanese Communication 1 is designed for students who have studied Japanese before and/or who have a qualification in Japanese.

We use a communicative Japanese teaching style at level 4, teaching speaking and listening through tasks such as pair-work and group work. Reading and writing input includes focus on independent learning strategies.. At level 5 you will be taught Japanese via content-and-language integrated learning – you will study aspects of Japanese cultures, communities and societies through the medium of Japanese. You will learn through giving and listening to presentations, reading and discussing news articles. There will be discussion of independent learning strategies, weekly tests and formative feedback on writing. In your Year Abroad, if you study at a host university in Japan, you will study Japanese language and culture, as well as modules relating to the Intercultural & Contemporary Communication side of your programme. Our level 6 Japanese language project modules use content-and-language integrated learning – you will study academic and professional Japanese through topics on Japanese cultures, communities and societies. You will learn through individual and/or group presentations, reading and discussion of authentic texts, and formative feedback on writing. You are expected to proactively engage with the language outside of class time at all levels.

Japanese modules are assessed with a combination of oral exam, videos, class tests and written work which varies according to the module. In addition, if you wish you can take the Japanese Language Proficiency Test for no extra fee at level 6.

We also provide opportunities for you to take part in extra-curricular activities related to Japanese language and culture: the vibrant student-run Japanese Society, where you can experience Japanese culture and meet home and exchange students, and the staff-led taiko drumming group, where you can learn a new skill and practice intercultural understanding.

### **Intercultural & Contemporary Communication**

Intercultural & Contemporary Communication modules are delivered using a mixture of lectures, workshops and seminars. Academic and research skills are embedded in modules, for example, academic writing and referencing, peer review, use of web based resources for document sharing, and the use of wikis and blogs. The assessment varies from module to module. Assessment methods include essays, presentations, data analysis, peer reviews, blog posts and research proposals and reports.

### **Year Abroad and Work Experience**

You will spend a year in Japan between level 5 and level 6. You will normally study abroad at one of our partner institutions. While studying abroad, you will take Japanese language classes at your host university. You will also take courses, either taught in English or in Japanese, which are relevant to the Intercultural & Contemporary Communication side of your degree. You are expected to fully engage with the tuition and assessment, but your grades will not count towards your York St John credits.

At the end of your Year Abroad you will submit a Reflective Report (module code 2LL321). Through this module you will reflect on your Year Abroad with particular reference to how your experience relates to the modules you studied at level 4 and 5 and will go on to study at level 6. As part of this module you will also carry out 10 days of work experience. This addresses the University commitment to ensuring that graduates of York St John have worked towards the development of their own post-graduation careers.

Instead of a year studying abroad plus 10 days of work experience, it may alternatively be possible to you to do a year-long work placement while in Japan.

## Level 6

Level 6 modules challenge you to investigate and critically evaluate socio-cultural and/or political contexts of language use through independent study. You learn research and academic literacy skills across both Japanese and Intercultural & Contemporary Communication modules, enabling you to construct a convincing argument, evidenced by critical engagement with appropriate sources, both orally and in writing, and in both English and Japanese. In the 40-credit dissertation module you conduct an independent research study of relevance to your programme, drawing on the research skills you have learned throughout the programme, and supported by additional skills sessions and up to six hours of one-on-one supervision.

### Progression and graduation requirements

The University's [general regulations for](#) undergraduate awards apply to this programme.

Any modules that must be passed for progression or award are indicated in the Programme Structure section.

In addition, the following programme-specific regulations apply in respect of progression and graduation.

The opportunity to participate in the Year Abroad is a privilege and approval will be given during level 5 subject to meeting the following criteria:

1. Completion of least 80% of non-assessed formative tasks in Japanese language modules in semester 1 and 2.
2. A pass on all level 5 modules (after resit(s) where applicable).
3. At least a serious attempt (a mark of 20 or above) on all level 5 semester 1 modules at first attempt.
4. No concerns have arisen under the Fitness to Study Policy that would prevent you from studying abroad.
5. No breaches of the York St John Code of Discipline.
6. Acceptance by a host institution.

In exceptional cases, if a student is not deemed suitable for study abroad, the Subject Director in consultation with the Head of School may not approve it. If you have otherwise met the requirements to progress to level 6, but have not met the criteria for the Year Abroad, it will usually be possible to transfer to a course which does not contain a study abroad element, most likely Language & Communication Studies.

Progression to level 6 at the end of the Year Abroad is determined by the pass/fail module 2LL321 Reflective Report. In the exceptional case of a student not completing the Year Abroad, progression to level 6 is not possible on this programme. In this exceptional case, you would transfer to a programme which does not contain Japanese at level 6, most likely Language & Communication Studies.

*In special circumstances where the students are not able to study abroad due to external factors (e.g. virus pandemic, war, political conflict), students will be consulted and may be able stay on this programme without going to study abroad.*
